



As well as his memo, I've attached the letter from 'Give a Hand', an article written by an old student called Ricky Yu, and two tapes of conversations I had with Ricky and the Projects Manager of 'Give a Hand'. I thought it would save you time if I spoke to them.

We want an article that will really get our students enthusiastic about joining the projects. Remember we're writing for teenagers, so don't go and copy chunks from the letter! I suggest you do the following:

- Get students interested by suggesting what they should do if they want an exciting, interesting summer.
- > Tell them about 'Give a Hand' and the kind of projects they run. Give a couple of examples of the work that volunteers might do.
- Encourage our Secondary 5 students to volunteer. Put the details of the projects suitable for them on a separate 'facts sheet' (see example attached).
- Point out the benefits for them, such as how it will help them develop (you may get some ideas from the attached documents and tapes).
- > Tell them they have to get the money together for their travel expenses, etc. Give them Ricky's ideas for raising money.
- Then say something about the application procedure and what kind of people 'Give a Hand' is looking for.
- Mention important dates and anything else volunteers should know. Don't forget to give the address of 'Give a Hand'.

Give your article this title: 'Give a Hand' and have an exciting summer. Don't forget to tell your readers to look at the 'facts sheet' for details about each project.

Looking forward to seeing the article. Good luck!

I would like you to put an article in the school newspaper about the 'Give a Hand' charity mentioned in the attached letter. Aim it at Secondary 5 students as they will have finished their exams. I think it is very important for students to be involved in this kind of thing, not only for the personal benefits it brings, but also because they can put it in their résumés and it might help them get a job or a university place. Remember they will have to be back in time to collect their Hong Kong Certificate Exam results and apply for a sixth form place, so that means being back in Hong Kong by the beginning of August at the latest.

I think one of our students worked with 'Give a Hand' two or three years ago and wrote an article in the school newspaper about his experience. He mentioned that he benefited a lot from it. Perhaps you could find the article and contact him for more information.

Volunteer summer workers

As you may remember, we are a charity which runs educational, health, agricultural and environmental projects in developing countries. We do this by bringing together young volunteers from different countries to work in small groups. We have fully-trained supervisors to deal with any problems.

Volunteers may do a number of different things. Agricultural and environmental volunteers help with small-scale water-supply projects, planting and caring for crops, tree planting, etc. Health volunteers might do anything from working at local clinics to helping landmine victims who have lost limbs to learn how to use artificial ones. Those taking part in the educational projects will probably be teaching young children.

These projects are very good for volunteers' communication skills, as the local people and volunteers may not have a language in common. This can be a great challenge. English is the official language of 'Give a Hand' so it is essential for volunteers to have some ability in English, though we do not require them to be fluent.

We require potential volunteers to write saying why they want to join 'Give a Hand', and which project they would like to take part in. We then make a shortlist of the most suitable applicants and invite them for an informal interview. We are really looking for people who get on well with others, and who are independent.

At present we have six-week projects planned for Bosnia, Albania, Morocco, and three-week ones planned for Cambodia, Laos, Vietnam and China. Unfortunately, we have to ask volunteers to pay their own travel expenses and something towards accommodation and food. In the past, we have found that companies in Hong Kong are often prepared to provide sponsorship to meet these costs.

Our volunteers have almost always enjoyed what they did and found that the experience provided them with long-lasting benefits.

Trees in the desert

Last summer, I was a volunteer with 'Give a Hand' on a project in Inner Mongolia in China. The project was helping local people to plant trees to stop the desert spreading.

There aren't any flights to Inner Mongolia from Hong Kong, so I flew from Shenzhen. When I got off the train and crossed the border at Lo Wu, I really felt I was on my way. I was so excited!

On the project, there were also volunteers from Europe and Japan and we all stayed with local families. I found it very interesting to meet all these people from other parts of the world and learn about their cultures. I made friends from many countries whom I am sure I will keep in touch with.

We ate with our host families and we had to communicate by sign language until we had learned a few words of the local language. That was a very good experience for me.

The work was hard and quite tiring, and to do it you really needed to be fit, but it was very nice being in the open countryside. It made me aware of how difficult life is for poor people in China.

Some of the volunteers had done this kind of thing over several summers. I met people who had taught in Africa and worked with sick people in India. It was fascinating to hear their stories.

The only major problem was raising enough money to pay for my fare, food and accommodation. First, I tried to get sponsorship from companies which did business in China. That gave me some money, but not enough, so then I contacted companies with a good reputation for protecting the environment, and got a little more money from them. Finally, I did a sponsored walk; I climbed up the two highest peaks on Lantau Island in one day. That was tiring!

If you want to do this kind of thing badly enough, it is always possible to find the money somehow. How you do it will depend on the kind of project you are doing and your interests. It needn't be a walk; it could be some other kind of sponsored activity.

This experience made me much more confident. I also learned how to co-operate with people because we all had to share everything and work together. I learned about how other people live, and did something really useful by taking part in this project.) If you want to do this too, join 'Give a Hand' because I think they're a really good organisation. They look after you well, and when you get accepted onto a project, they give you an information pack which tells you everything you need to know. So don't worry, just apply!



On the other hand, the projects are good for your communication skills and you may have the chance to use sign language to communicate with the local people. Also, it will be a great opportunity to improve your English. You will be given more chances to speak in English because it may be the only channel that allows you to communicate with others due to the fact that people may come from different countries. If you join the project in China, it is nice for you to enjoy being in the open countryside. Moreover, you can put this experience in your resumes and it might help you get a job or a university place, or, at

least, give you some interesting things to talk about in a job interview. Joining the projects must make you much more confident.

As 'Give a Hand' is a charity, there is not enough money to cover all the expenses and so you have to pay for your own travel, food and accommodation expenses. PART B

1st interview: a conversation between Mr. Brown (B), the editor of the school newspaper and Ms. Windsor (W), the Projects Manager of 'Give a Hand'

W: Right, Mr. Brown, what can I do for you?

B: We're writing an article in the school newspaper about the 'Give a Hand'. Could you give me details of the projects you have for this summer?

W: It really depends on how long your students would be able to stay. Our projects

are in blocks of either 3 or 6 weeks.

B: We want to aim the article at Secondary 5 leavers. Most of them will have to be back by the beginning of August to get their HKCEE results and apply for sixth form places, so I think it will have to be the three week ones.

W: Well, all our three-week projects are in Asia. They're in Cambodia, Laos, Vietnam and China. Would you like me to tell you something about them?

B: Yes, please.

W: The one in Cambodia is a health project in a small town.

B: What will they be doing there?

W: Helping people who've lost their legs.

B: Lost their legs?

- W: Yes, a lot of mines were buried in the ground during the war, and when these people stepped on them, they got their legs blown off.
- B: Oh dear. I'm rather worried about the possible danger to our students. I'm not sure parents will want their children to join this project if they think they might step on
- W: Oh there's absolutely no danger. All the mines have been cleared around this small town where we work. Please make that clear to the students and parents.
- B: Right, that's a relief. I'll make sure it says on the fact sheet that it's absolutely safe because the mines have been cleared. So, what do the volunteers have to do exactly?

W: Well, they'll help the injured people learn to use their artificial legs by doing exercises with them.

- B: So, volunteers help people who've lost their legs. They help them learn how to use artificial legs by doing exercises with them. How about the food and accommodation?
- W: The volunteers will stay with local families and have breakfast and dinner with them. Lunch will be provided by us at the places where they work.

B: So, breakfast and dinner with local families, and lunch provided at work. And volunteers will have to pay all these, will they?

W: Yes, that's right. We don't have enough money to support the volunteers, so they have to pay travel expenses and something towards food and accommodation. In this case, it would be \$3,000 for the flight, and \$250 a week towards food and accommodation.

B: Okay, so, um... what other projects can you tell me about?

W: We have an educational one in Laos.

B: Laos? That sounds interesting.

W: Yes, It's teaching young children in Vientiane which is the capital.

B: Sorry, how do you spell 'Vientiane'?

W: V-I-E-N-T-I-A-N-E. Volunteers will teach small groups of young children English and Maths at a summer camp.

B: At a summer camp?

W: Yes, the summer camp has been organized to try to make learning fun for the children as well as teaching. Volunteers will play games with them.

B: So, this project is really for those who like young children and playing games with them.

W: That's right.

B: And where will the volunteers stay and eat?

- B: Oh, that'll be nice for them. And how much will the project cost the volunteers?
- W: The flight will be \$3,550 and food and accommodation will be \$200 per week.
- B: Okay, so it's teaching young children English and Maths at a summer camp. Playing games with them, and staying and eating with the other volunteers in a hostel. It sounds like it could be very fun.

W: Yes, um... we need students who are good at Maths and English and who like

children. I'm sure they'll very enjoy it.

B: We'll have to mention these requirements in the fact sheet. Now then, what are the other projects in Asia?

W: Okay, the next one I'll tell you about is the one in Vietnam. This is another educational one but there's no teaching. It's building a school in a village in a mountain.

B: That sounds interesting. It is in the mountains. I suppose it will be cooler than the other projects.

W: Yes that's right. Volunteers may even need a thin sweater at night.

B: Ok, I'll remind the students to take a thin sweater for the night. Where will the volunteers be staying?

W: They'll stay and eat with local families.

B: Is there anything else our students should know about this project?

W: No, not really, except that it is nice and cool in the mountain.

- B: So, this is a project for students who like cool weather, and, how much is it?
- W: Um... \$2,000 for the flight and \$250 per week for food and accommodation.

B: Right, and what's the other project?

W: This is an environmental project. It involves planting trees to stop the desert spreading in China.

Uh... is this one in Mongolia?

W: Yes, that's right. How do you know?

B: One of our students went on it a few years ago and wrote about it in the school newspaper.

W: Oh good. Then, if you have the information about the project in the article, I only need to tell you how much it is this year. The airfare to Inner Mongolia is \$1,500 and the food and accommodation is \$400 per week.

B: And the volunteers have to make their only way to Shenzhen, right?

W: Yes, that's right. Unfortunately there're no flights from Hong Kong.

B: So I must let the students know that they have to make their only way to Shenzhen. Right, thank you very much for your help. Is there anything else I should tell potential volunteers?

W: Don't worry. When we take on volunteers, we give them an information pack about what they need. Is that everything then?

B: Um... no... I forgot to ask about dates.

W: Um... the three-week projects are from July the 5th until July the 26th. By the way, volunteers don't have to buy their own tickets as we make all the travel arrangements but they must give us the money for their tickets, food and accommodation by June the 14th.

B: Ok, money before June the 14th. I mustn't forget to mention that. And you'll give all students accepted in the project an information pack. That should be very useful for them. When will they know that they've been accepted on the project?

W: By May the 15th. And please don't forget to write our address in the article. Oh. and the deadline for applications is April the 1st.

- W: Not at all. Thank you for writing about us. Goodbye.

2nd Interview: a conversation between Mr. Brown (B) and Ricky Yu (R), a student who took part in a 'Give a Hand' project 3 years ago

B: Hello, Ricky Yu.

R: Yes, what can I do for you?

B: Hi, I'm Harry Brown, the editor of St. Steven's newspaper. I hope you don't mind my coming round to see you. But a few years ago, you were a volunteer for a charity called 'Give a Hand' and wrote an article for our paper about it.

R: Oh yes. It was three years ago after I finished Secondary 5.

B: We want to write an article encouraging students to join. You said some very positive things about the 'Give a Hand' project you did.

R: Yes, it was great. It was the best experience of my life.

B: That's good. One thing that worries me though is how the students are going to get the money together for their fares, food and accommodation. Have you any suggestions?

R: Well, I would try to get sponsorships from companies. You can get the names of companies by going to the TDC, you know, the Trade Development Council.

B: Uh, that's a good idea. I haven't thought of contacting the Trade Development Council for likely sponsors.

R: I also raised money by doing a sponsored walk, so your students can always do that kind of thing. It doesn't have to be a walk. It could be a swim, or a bicycle ride or something.
