1. Susan is a Secondary 7 student about to take the Advanced Level Examinations. One day she sees something while surfing online.

Source A: An online advertisement

Source B: Susan talks to her best friend, Kitty, about the advertisement

- Susan: Look what I've found!
- Kitty: Oh! Be a superstar? You're kidding.
- Susan: How wonderful! You know I like singing. Imagine standing on the stage all dressed up, and singing to my fans! I'll be different. People will love me!
- Kitty: Wake up, Susan. It's not that easy. You're busy enough now. You'd better spend your time on revision; the A-levels are coming!
- Susan: It's always A-levels! I can't go shopping because of A-levels. I can't go to karaoke anymore because of A-levels. Not everyone needs to go to university!
- Kitty: I agree. But please be honest with yourself. Are you choosing not to go to university or are you just being irresponsible?
- (a) Identify the different reactions of Susan and Kitty to the advertisement. Why do you think they have different reactions? (10 marks)
- (b) You are the career guidance teacher in the school. How would you help Susan to decide whether or not going to university is the right choice for her? (10 marks)

Here are brochures from some of the best schools in the USA. Please read them and prepare Dad: for interviews. The USA? I'm going to the USA? Zita: Mom: Yes, next year. You'd better make up your mind about which schools you like. There's a lot to prepare. But I don't want to go! All my friends are here! Zita: Dad: We've worked very hard to pay for you to attend these famous schools. They're so expensive. You can get to know important people and get a good job when you graduate! Mom: We love you. That's why we've worked very hard, so that we can send you overseas! Why didn't you talk to me about this before? You two are never at home! And when you do Zita: come back, you tell me you're sending me away! Oh, we know what's best for you. Come on, read the brochures and tell us which schools you Dad: like.

- (a) What do you think may be the causes of the above conflict between Zita and her parents? (10 marks)
- (b) Suggest ways in which Zita could persuade her parents to change their minds without harming her relationship with them. (10 marks)

Consider the following article about women in Hong Kong.

Some of the city's most accomplished women believe the soaring social status of Hong Kong women comes at a high price. They say that high positions invariably mean staying single.

Film director Barbara Wong Chun-chun, who made the award-winning documentary *Women's Private Parts* about female sexuality, said, "Compared with their counterparts in other Asian countries, women in Hong Kong enjoy the highest social status, especially in the working environment. There's almost no discrimination against women in Hong Kong. If you are capable, you can climb high; whereas in Japan, it's hard for women to find work if they are in their 30s or 40s. But the traditional mindset hasn't changed in Hong Kong. It's okay for wives to sit at home waiting for their busy husbands but not the other way round."

Qi Qi, voted Model of the Year in January by *South China Morning Post* readers, agreed that, in terms of women's status, Hong Kong is the most advanced society in Asia. However, Hong Kong people are still Chinese, no matter how westernised they have become.

Feng shui master Mak Ling-ling observed that marriage continues to enjoy high priority among women. She said that 19 out of 20 clients who consulted her were females seeking advice about their relationships.

Singer Kelly Chen Wai-lam said that modern women should let go of the marriage idea because marriage is not necessary for happiness.

- (a) How important do you think marriage is to women in Hong Kong today? Explain your answer with reference to the above article. (10 marks)
- (b) How far do you think the above article reflects the real situation concerning women's status in Hong Kong? (10 marks)

SECTION 2

Answer one question from this section.

4. Raves are quite popular among local young people. They are all-night dance events where DJs and other performers play electronic rave music, and dancing continues until dawn.

Source A: Report on raves in Hong Kong

Nine in every 10 youngsters attending a rave either in Hong Kong or across the border are likely to have taken recreational drugs.

Of these, one in every 13 is likely to be involved in sexual activities during or after the rave while one in 19 is likely to be involved in a fight, according to a survey conducted by the Chinese University of Hong Kong between September 2004 and March 2005. The survey covered 300 respondents aged between 14 and 28.

An Associate Professor at the Chinese University of Hong Kong said the widespread use of 'party drugs' brings with it other dangers such as unprotected sex, fights and car races.

Source B: A gentler way to fight recreational drug use

Recreational drug use is the most serious problem among young people participating in raves. Social workers are trying hard to tackle this consequence of the popularity of raves.

Chu Fung, a Hong Kong Caritas social worker, commented that communication is an important tool. He said, "They can get really bored during the long hours they spend at discos and they want to talk. That's when social workers can build relationships with them through conversation. We try to dissuade them from drug use by giving them medical and objective points of view. Hopefully, this will have an impact on them over time and lead them to reconsider their actions."


Item A: A poster showing a fixed penalty for littering






Item C: Kelvin's blog
